SYLLABUS

On September 19, 1975, the Judicial Inquiry Board filed a three-paragraph complaint with the Courts Commission, charging the respondent with conduct that brings the judicial office into disrepute. The complaint alleged that in May of 1975 a young married woman came to the courtroom of the respondent for the purpose of paying a fine on behalf of her husband who had been cited for a traffic violation; that under court procedures, the place to pay the fine was not at the respondent's courtroom but at a court facility located elsewhere; that the woman entered the respondent's chambers upon the respondent's suggestion that he would advise her as to the appropriate disposition of the traffic citation; that the respondent engaged the woman in a private conversation in which he "insistently proposed" that she should dine with him on another day; and that the

“nature and manner of said proposal were demeaning” to the woman, to the respondent and to his judicial office. The respondent resigned from judicial office prior to a hearing by the Courts Commission.

Held: Complaint dismissed.
